"Treasure Hunting" Article From "The Canadian Brewerianist"

The following article appeared in 1995 (Volume 13) issue #5 of "The Canadian Brewerianist." It is a great little article on finding that elusive piece of breweriana. I have never been to this much trouble to get an opener or corkscrew but I have certainly dreamed of finding that rare item in a similar situation. In the end a rare Peerless Lager Beer bottle was obtained.

Back in volume 12 #10 we ran a story about a very rare bottle that had been sighted in Saskatchewan. The latest issue of the Big Chief newsletter reports on how after reading about it, Paul Wingert #773 used ingenuity and persistence to track down this treasure.

The Plan - I phoned up Dick Sweet and asked him who had spotted it. "I did," said Dick. After some grilling he told me he'd seen it in Watrous (pop. 2000) a town too big to go door to door. A newspaper ad, my first idea was shot down when a friend told me Watrous had no newspaper. (He was wrong.) After thinking about it for a while I decided door to door inquiry would be the only way. I altered one of my "Wanted Posters" to include a Peerless Lager and made 450 copies.

The Trip - On Labour Day weekend I, along with my family and one of my friends drove up to Watrous. Unfortunately it rained most of the drive up but luckily it wasn't raining in Watrous. The kids delivered the fliers and finally -- a few hours later we were done. Two blocks of houses remained unflyered as I had not made enough fliers.

The Result - The next couple of weeks I waited for results. A few calls came in -- Olde Bohemian Style, Old Style Pilsener, etc. No thanks. After a month passed I thought I'd either missed the house or the owner was keeping what he had. Over the next six months I'd more or less given up on it and was thinking of trying an ad in the newspaper when on April 27, 1995 my wife said to me, "There's some guy on the phone about bottles again." I answered. He started describing the bottle he had. I wrote down Peerless Lager Beer before anything sunk in. The result is that the Peerless now sits in my bottle room where it has always belonged.

No one responded about Harry Horn's M-19 marked "Keller". Ray Schmeisser found an M-19 marked Wolter's / Pilsener. Does anyone have any information on the origin of this opener?

Ben Hoffman found an E-8 with the following wording, "Made By The Autoyre Co. Oakville, Conn. / We Make The Best And Cheapest Crown Openers." Are they the sole manufacturers of type "E-8" openers? If anyone has any information about this company please let me know.

Bill Gormally has 2 L-9 Bud openers. One has the opener at the top of the bottle and the other has the opener at the bottom of the bottle. Has anyone else seen or have both varieties?

Art Santen turned up a B-70-1 Liberty (96 New Discovery) at the St. Louis BCCA (Beer Can) convention in August. During the trip and at the same show Larry Moter turned up the following pile of "E"s, 9 E-1s, 21 E-4s including a Granite City, IL, 4 E-6 & 7s including a Lancaster, OH, 2 E-8s (Atlas and Gipps), 5 E-9s including a Krantz, OH, 30 E-13 & 14s, and finally an E-18 Haffenreffer. A fabulous show for any opener collector and especially an "E" type collector. I guess everyone will be heading to next year's BCCA convention.

At an August breweriana show in Pennsylvania, an A-47 Krug was bought by a JFO member. One of the dealers at the show had turned up 2 Kaier's Wall Mounts (R-8-1). He kept one for himself and sold the other to a friend for \$200.

ECBA Annual Convention Kingston, NY (July 12th-16th 1995)

The Eastern Coast Breweriana Association (ECBA) is a breweriana collector's club of about 550 members. This year's convention in Kingston, NY was attended by 120 members. The Woodstock Brewing Company, a local micro brewery, was the host brewery. A lot of excellent breweriana is available and as I have found out about breweriana a great place to find openers and corkscrews.

We left Durham at 5:30 Wednesday morning. This time our dog Cognac was tagging along. Driving up I-95 is never a fun task and by the time you pay a bunch of tolls the nerves are certainly on edge. After a ten and a half hour drive we arrived at the Holiday Inn Holidrome in Kingston. The room we were assigned was too small so after a few minutes we were settled in our room. Several members had rooms open, so I immediately headed out to check on what was available. Pat and Cognac were left to get things organized. Of course Norm and Judy Jay had already checked in and Norm had checked the rooms out pretty good. Not much turned up but Ken Ostrow one of the top breweriana dealers was checking in. Friday was spent going room-to-room as summer's first big heat wave hit the Northeast. Norm did agree to our trade. So I have another K-4 Tapster in my collection. I did pick up a few miscellaneous openers, the best one being an M-62-1 Schlitz in the box. Friday evening was the ECBA banquet dinner. Our guest speaker was the owner of the Woodstock Brewing Company. He certainly had an interesting background. He had started in brewing by making beer in the late 60's and 70's for a commune he lived in. Harold Queen was absent all day but finally showed up Friday evening. He had taken the day to go to the big antique market at Brimfield. Harold said he only covered about a fourth of the show but he did find a nice N-8-2 Haberle. I ended up trading Harold a couple of wall mounts for the N-8-2.

Saturday morning is the annual ECBA breakfast meeting. I was re-elected Membership Secretary. A report of sales for American Breweries II showed that the new edition was doing very well. The 1996 ECBA Convention is set for Boston, the 1997 Convention will be in Lancaster, PA, and the 1998 Convention is going to be held at the Oldenberg Brewery in Ft. Mitchell, KY. Afterwards a show open to the public started. I passed on setting up a table as Pat and I were leaving at lunch time to go see Don and Bonnie Bull.

We left Kingston at 12:30 and after a two hour drive arrived at Don and Bonnie's house in Stamford, Ct. 1998 ECBA Convention, Fort Mitchell, KY at Oldenberg

NABA Annual Convention Chattanooga, TN (August 2nd-6th 1995)
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The National Association of Breweriana Advertising (NABA) is a breweriana collector's club of about 1300 members. JFO members are prominent in the NABA organization. Fil Graff is president, Norm Jay and Dave Gausepohl are officers, and Herb Haydock is one of the original founding members. The 1995 convention was NABA's first trip to the Southeast. About 150 members attended.

We left Durham early Wednesday morning, dropped off Cognac at my parents home in Winston-Salem and continued westward towards Tennessee. I had estimated a six hour trip but AAA had routed through the mountains on scenic highways. After 8 and 1/2 hours of driving we arrived in Chattanooga at the hotel at 4:45. After checking in I went to register for the convention. Several rooms were open and of course I ran into Norm Jay as I entered my third room. A couple from Iowa had several good openers. Norm got an A-35-14 Miller and an N-35-UL Hamms. I picked up an P-54-UL Schiller, an A-28-39 McInnery, and a nice old wide deck of cards advertising Clysmic soda. The couple also had two Coca-Cola openers, an A-43 Horse Head from Waterloo, Iowa and an E-9 Coca-Cola from Beatrice, Nebr. The A-43 was expensive (\$225) and I wanted to see what else was available before making an offer.

The hotel had three buildings with rooms and NABA was to be in building 2 and 3. We had checked into building one and we wanted to be in the main building which was number 3. After some discussion at the front desk we switched to building 3. We got settled in the room and then I took off to see what was available in other rooms. I picked up several \$2 to \$10 openers but nothing real exciting. Later that evening I went to Norm's room to work on another of our "big trades." Unlike before this trade was over pretty quickly. Norm had brought his collection of H-1s and a B-9-Centennial. I had 5 E-4, C-13 types he needed plus 3 beer knives (N-4-Wooden Shoe, N-33-Weibel, and an N-43-Bub). I needed 8 of Norm's H-1s. After a short discussion I offered my pile for his. Norm thought for a few seconds and pushed his pile and grabbed mine. His comment being that for once I was being really fair. A side note was Norm did pass up a F-2-14 Independent in one of the rooms. He won't miss many good items whether they are expensive or cheap. This F-2 had soda advertising on the top side and advertises the Independent Milwaukee Brewery underneath. Norm didn't bother to turn it over and it was still available when I came in the room after him. It was a good buy at \$5.

Thursday is usually the best day to pick up items at conventions. The early birds from Wednesday are all set up and most everyone arrives and sets up on Thursday. This convention was no exception. Early in the morning I went a room that I had supposedly checked out the night before. A couple of small cases had the usual overpriced "E"s and "I"s but in a case but itself was an A-15-UL Home City Brewing Co. from Springfield, OH. I got it for \$10. Later in the morning I decided to go to the Iowa couple and make an offer for the two Coca-Cola openers. I asked them their best price and the husband said \$225 for the pair. I offered \$200 and after a few seconds to think about it the husband agreed. The \$175 I paid for the A-43 was the most I have ever paid for an opener.

We were deciding where to go to lunch when we ran into Harold and Boots Queen. They had just arrived and were going to ride the shuttle downtown to eat at the brew pub (Big River Grille). We decided to go along and had an excellent lunch. Afterwards I came back for an afternoon nap. About mid-afternoon I ran into Harold again.

He said a room had just opened and the guy was selling 133 openers for \$350 but he couldn't remember what room the guy was in. Harold was getting his room straight so I started walking our building looking for the 133 openers. Our building had 5 floors and I started on the top floor and sure enough the next to the last room on the first floor was where I found the openers. The first one that caught my eye was a B-32-1 Arrow. Don Bull had just sent me his and now a second one shows up. As with most deals like this there were a lot \$1 and under openers but I started figuring. There were 3 slide-outs (M-3-Lang, M-3-Edelweiss, M-3-S&K), a B-25-Buckeye, about 20 B's all together, a lot of C's, E's and I's. I offered \$300 and the reply was \$325 was the best price. I had to go back to my room for a check and upon my return all of the openers had been wrapped up. I paid for them and headed back to my room.

Harold Queen showed up and he said there were a few that he had been interested in but he did not want to buy all 133. Since Harold had told me about the openers I let him have the M-3-Lang (EX), a C-13-Von, a C-13-Zynda, a C-13-Phoenix, and an I-7-Atlas. Later on Norm Jay took the B-25-Buckeye and 3 other openers. I ended up holding onto the B-32-1 Arrow and a B-22-99 Fitzer's. The \$325 was not a cheap price but I can come out okay. If you get around very much this is the type of situation one runs into more often than not. You have to buy a bunch of openers to get a few that you really want. Later that evening we went with the Jays, the Queens, and another couple back to the Big River Grille for supper. A few miscellaneous openers turned up after supper but nothing unusual.

Fridays at the NABA convention are usually reserved for the auction. By then most everything has been checked out as far as room-to-room trading. The auction is a 4 to 5 hour event with a lot of high dollar breweriana being offered for sale. Usually few openers or corkscrews are offered and this year was no exception. I spent most of the day keeping my room open while Pat went with Judy to the Chattanooga Aquarium. I did get up with Bob and Marge Stahly. We went to lunch at the Big City Grille (as I said before the food was excellent and the beer was good also). Bob bought a few openers from me and he had turned up 2 nice wall mounts (O-2-Columbia and an O-2-Seven-Up) in mint conditions. These 2 were bought from the couple from Iowa. They had bought a bunch of advertising items belonging to a traveling salesman. Bob has an outstanding opener collection and also a great wall mount opener collection.

Friday evening was the NABA buffet dinner and afterwards I spent some time checking rooms out. Pat spent Friday evening going room-to-room trying to sell copies of American Breweries II. ECBA had sent me 3 cases of books (108 books) to sell at the NABA convention. Most NABA members had already bought one before the convention, but Pat did manage to sell 12 copies Friday evening. At the Saturday show we sold 4 more. The book is an excellent reference for determining the history of any kind of breweriana including openers and corkscrews (you can order one from your editor for \$25.00 plus \$2.00 postage).

Saturday morning found everyone getting ready for the public show. Even though the show did not start until 10:00 people were setting up at 8:00. A few tables being set-up had new items as some members do not open their rooms up but wait until the Saturday show. I found a few miscellaneous openers but nothing real good. Towards the end of the day a Nebraska collector came by my table and said he had sold one good opener early on. It was a C-30-1 Gambrinus. I hadn't seen it, Harold Queen and Norm Jay had not bought it, but the last time I saw Bob Stahly he was heading out the door smiling (so I assume you bought it).

On my table I did have a display of Tennessee openers and local NABA member George Love came by to check out my display. George had a B-21-Chattanooga and a B-22-Reif's Special on a key ring. I told George that I had a B-19-Reif's just like his B-22 in my soda box. He said that "Reif's Special" was Chattanooga Brewing Co's prohibition soda and was named after the owner George Reif, Jr. He said he had a supporting document (shown below) and we now have 2 more 1996 additions to the Handbook. The show ends at 3:00 and at 2:30 a local gentleman walked in and after asking a couple of members ended up talking to Fil Graff about an opener he had brought for show. Fil was trying to buy the opener and when I saw it I tried to but in to no avail. Fil and I were both drooling over a R-8-1 Kaiers wall mount from Mahanoy City, Pa. The man was originally from Mahanoy City and did not want to sale the R-8. He was interested in knowing its value. Fil graciously offered \$50, I said about \$100 to \$150 since the paint was half gone but told him \$700-\$800 if it had been in excellent condition. He also had an unusual pocket mirror advertising Kaiers. After a short talk the man left with his little treasure. The show ended at 3:00 and Pat and myself spent the rest of the afternoon resting before the formal NABA banquet.

At the banquet we ate with the Queens and Henry and Linda Smith. Henry is an avid collector of Cincinnati area breweriana including openers. He had just turned up an E-17-UL from the Lion Brewing Co. of Cincinnati. I have a D-8-2 Lion that Henry has wanted. Since I told him that I like E-17s he offered his E-17 for my D-8 and \$100. After cleaning my ears out I told Henry thanks but no thanks. We had an enjoyable dinner and after saying our good-byes turned in early. We left Chattanooga the next morning at 6:15 and arrived back in Durham at 3:00. Another great convention passed by quickly.

"Shrapnel's Corkscrew" by Doris Athineos of Forbes Magazine

His frequent business trips abroad give Robert Goldscheider plenty of opportunity to indulge in his particular passion: collecting corkscrews. (Many thanks to Harold Queen for submitting this article).

When lawyer Robert Goldscheider fancies a glass of wine, he spends more time deciding on the corkscrew than on the bottle.

Sifting through 14 drawers filled with 1,100 European and American corkscrews, he finally settles on the English 1884 double-lever Wier. A tug on the top loop sets the accordion action into motion. "It has a startling effect when you can open a bottle," says Goldscheider.

The first corkscrew patent was granted two centuries ago to the Reverend Samuel Henshall of Birmingham, England. He devised a collar that separated the screw from the shank. With a few quick twists, the worm cleanly drills the cork and the collar stops it from piercing the far end of the cork.

Henshall's device was an elegant solution to what had been an annoying problem ever since corks became commonplace as stops for wine bottles in the mid-18th century: cork bits in the wine.

Goldscheider has an original Henshall with an appropriate Latin motto inscribed on the button: *Obstando promoves* (by standing firm one advances). It's worth about \$7,500.

"The scholarship of corkscrews is a lot of fun," says Goldscheider, 66. The admixture of collecting and technology appeals to Goldscheider. He's author of *Technology Management* and chairman of the International Licensing Network, Ltd., technology management consultants. Patent dates, often marked on the metal shank and sometimes on the wooden handles, first hooked him. "They're worth twice as much [patent] marked, and I love to see the evolution of corkscrews made by the same company," says Goldscheider.

His collecting began when he paid \$5 for three rusty corkscrews at an estate sale in East Hampton, N.Y. in 1976. Today he estimates his collection is worth \$500,000, about four times what he paid for it. Goldscheider often spends evenings oiling the levers and polishing the silver, brass and steel. "It's very relaxing bringing them back to life," he says.

His best information source is *Corkscrews for Collectors* (by Bernard Watney and Homer Babbidge, Sotheby's Publications, \$39.95), which contains patent drawings and descriptions dating back centuries. "Sometimes we know what they look like from patent drawings, but no one has ever seen them," explains Goldscheider. "Then all of a sudden one appears in the back kitchen of a chateau or at an estate sale."

That's what happened with the Shrapnel, the most eagerly sought after corkscrew on the market today. It was the brainchild of a retired British Army captain, Henry Shrapnel, son of the artillery officer who invented the exploding lead projectile. Henry Shrapnel patented the folding-handle corkscrew in 1839. Angling for a posthumous knighthood for his father, Shrapnel gave Prince Albert a steel-and-silver corkscrew with a needlepoint apron in 1840. Shrapnel remained sirless, but the Shrapnel corkscrew had been given a royal touch.

However, no one had seen one in recent years. Then in December 1985, a Shrapnel popped up at Sotheby's in London, and promptly fetched \$2,384. Last year another Shrapnel, with a black leather apron that fits over the neck of the bottle, was sold for nearly \$10,000. And in May of this year, a European collector paid \$6,727 for a Shrapnel auctioned at Christie's in London. "It's amazing how many are turning up now," says corkscrew dealer Dean Walters of San Anselmo, Calif. "It's not as rare as people thought."

Shrapnels bring high prices at auction more for their rarity than for their design. "They were lousy corkscrews, so not many people bought them," says Goldscheider, who has a solid barrel Shrapnel in his own corkscrew arsenal.

Goldscheider travels frequently on business, which gives him plenty of opportunity to go corkscrew-hunting. His favorite haunts include London's Bermondsey market on Friday mornings and Portobello Road on Saturdays. "Seven years ago I found a box of corkscrews in a bazaar in Marrakesh," he recalls. "I paid \$20 for the lot. They looked like junk, but I cleaned them up and found a zigzag Suplex." The French zigzag is worth about \$200.

Goldscheider is a member of the elite International Correspondence of Corkscrew Addicts (ICCA). It admits only 50 members and puts applicants on the waiting list until someone dies or withdraws. "One requirement is that you must send photos of your six best corkscrews to the other 49 members each year," says Goldscheider. "That keeps us fairly competitive with one another." ICCA also holds private auctions among its members.

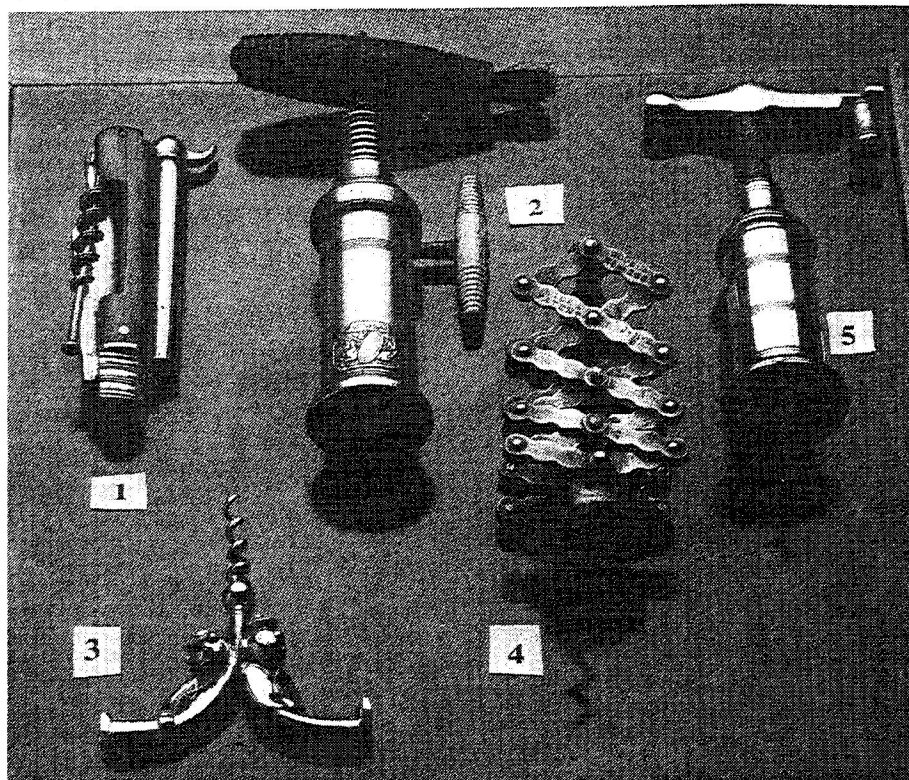
What determines price? Generally, rarity and mechanics count more than age. Prices for English, German and French corkscrews are spiraling upward, but more utilitarian, 19th-century American corkscrews lag. "American patents have not gotten their fair shake," says Ron MacLean, chief correspondent of the ICCA. A book on American patents by Fred O'Leary, tentatively titled *U.S. Corkscrew Patents*, is scheduled for publication next year and will list 1,000 American patents. Then watch prices rise. Other possibly undervalued areas include 19th-century knives with corkscrews, especially from Solingen, Germany and Sheffield, England.

In London, the Victoria and Albert Museum's Metalwork department keeps a stash of corkscrews in storage and will bring them out, by appointment (44171-938-8352). It takes the French to fill a museum entirely with corkscrews. You can visit the Musee du Tire-Bouchon, in Menerbes, while driving around the south of France.

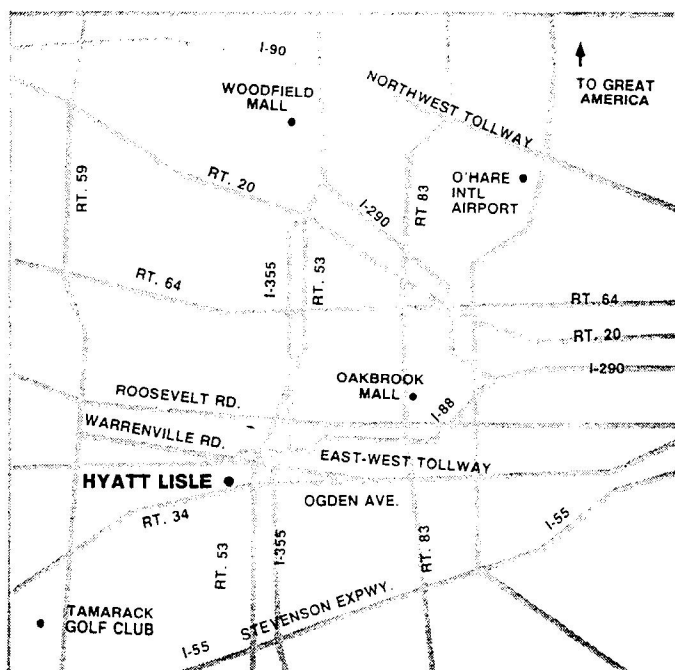
